REFERENCES AND SCREENING PROCESS

Before we can place a dog in an adoptive home, our club procedure is to do a pre-screening. This requires that one of our rescue committee or club designated person come to visit your home to see where the dog will be living and meet the family members including other pets. We are not checking on your decorating skills, but are looking for a home that is safe and comfortable for one of our rescues and meets any special needs we may have to take into consideration for them. We also call your veterinarian's office as a reference. If you have not had a dog in several years, they may no longer have your information available. If you have moved or changed vets, or want to change vets, please list the vet who would have the **most** information on one of your last pets. If you've never had a pet before, you obviously won't have a vet reference, so we will use other references instead. We would also like the contact information for 2 personal references and how you know them. These can be neighbors, coworkers, friends or family members, but we'd prefer a variety. We understand this is intrusive, so will be asking them just a few questions, we will not take a lot of their time. Once you are screened, you can meet any available rescue that would be a good match for you, until you find one you want to proceed with. If you have another dog, they need to meet also.

ADOPTION PROCESS

At the time of adoption, you will be asked to make an adoption donation to the Scottish Terrier Club of Greater New York's Rescue program, read and sign some adoption contracts. Our adoption fees are now on a sliding scale, based in part on the age and health of the dog, our costs and the expected continuing costs to the owner after adoption. Please feel free to ask us about the fees before you make your decision. We run our rescue program on donations alone and spare no expense on the dogs in our care. We do not pass the full cost of their care onto the adopters, as we do not want to discourage good homes for our rescues, based on finances alone. However, all dogs require increasing medical attention as they age and we do want to also make sure that applicants understand and are in a financial position to provide this for our rescues. All paperwork relating to the dog will be explained and given to the adopter.
